LOOKING BACK/LOOKING FORWARD

NOVEMBER 2010

When we look back at our Church activities 10 years from now, I think we will view 2010 as a significant decision making year.

The first critical decision was made by the congregation at our May congregational meeting where the congregation gave very strong support to the new governance structure for TMUC. This new model is designed to streamline Board and Committee activities and decisions and reduces both the number of committees as well as the membership on the remaining committees. It also introduces a new concept called 'House Groups' to spread out the weekly tasks such as ushering and scripture readings. The new structure will force renewal of committee and board members and reduce time commitments to hopefully encourage more young people and individuals also holding full time jobs to be active participants in the governance of our church. The Terms of Reference for the new governance model were approved by the congregation at the November 7th congregational meeting, as were the initial make up of the new teams.

The second major decision also happened at our November 7th congregational meeting. The Building Committee presented the results of their work. They had been asked to look at the costs of either building a new church or renovating and expanding our current facility. The results of their work indicated that both options would cost over \$5 million. Since both of these options were projected to cost in excess of \$5 million the congregation was asked whether they supported fundraising and taking on a project of that magnitude. A secret ballot was held and the vote by members of TMUC was 44 in favour and 74 against going in that direction. The council was then asked to consider a third option which was renovating our current facility (without expansion). The council will come back to the congregation with a plan to explore just renovating our current facility. As St. George's Anglican Church had approached TMUC on the

TESSA IN TRINIDAD

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Tessa Blaikie, a member of this congregation, has just begun a six month stay in Trinidad volunteering with the Joint Overseas Mission Action Team (JOMAT). It is funded and organized by The Caribbean and North American Council of Churches for Mission (CANACOM) and its Canadian partner, the United Church of Canada. This trip is one of their many and varied global overseas partnership programs.

Tessa writes:

The Presbyterian Church came to Trinidad in 1878 and began work with the indentured laborers from India, after the formation of the United Church of Canada in 1925 the Presbyterian Church of Trinidad and Tobago (PCTT) partnered with them, this relationship is now one of mutual giving. The PCTT is hosting the JOMAT unexpectedly because the original JOMAT plan in Guyana could not be carried out. Because of the change we have not started volunteering in working contexts yet but are primarily visiting with all of the social outreach projects the PCTT is involved in or would like to be, and getting to know people. I

have collected a wealth of cultural knowledge, as well as a Milky Way of mosquito bites, for real Winnipeggers, you have nothing on Trinidad!

The list of the projects I will be volunteering my skills at, learning on and sharing in include; working with people with disabilities who have limited rights and are heavily neglected culturally here, working with abused children in foster homes, working with men and women recovering from addictions, working within the school system to promote sport, health and self esteem and working with inner city children as a mentor.

As I learn on this trip some of the cultural differences, some of the faith differences I hope to carry deep appreciation with me, as well as an understanding of the colonial role in shaping Trinidad. It is essential to note that it was Canadian Christians who formed this particular church. And as Canadian Christianity has developed within our church, the United Church of Canada (UCC), it has not always done so in other churches. I am proud and grateful to be a United Church of Canada member, where rights of people with disabilities are recognized, where members of the gay community are accepted, where honesty and humility are valued beyond the surface appearances of being a 'good Christian'. We are as a people called to share in love, no matter one's religion we are people of God/Gods/Goddesses. Jesus taught us to accept the sick, the social outcast, the poor and the lame. The people here have most certainly accepted us, the Canadians, and the youth are very forward thinking, but in this context of strict cultural church norms and differing views, I more deeply appreciate that I call UCC home.

possibility of looking together at our respective future requirements and shared ministry, that will also be considered. While it is clear from the above vote that there are different views on the direction TMUC should take relative to our building, the congregation did make a long overdue decision that allows the council and congregation to continue to move forward.

There is an old quote by Georg Lichtenberg, 'I cannot say whether things will get better if we change, what I can say is they must change if they are to get better'. I think that quote is very fitting given the stage we are at in the evolution of TMUC. Of course both of these decisions are very long term in nature. On the shorter term a very good response from our congregation has resolved most of our financial concerns for this year, although we are coming up to a very critical period for givings and we need to finish the year with a similar momentum. The newly established dinner theatre group should also assist us financially as we

The newly established dinner theatre group should also assist us financially as we move forward.

On a final note the change in the Board Chair to Gail Purcell, originally scheduled for September, was delayed until November as Gail wanted to focus on the transition to the new governance structure. This of course is a large undertaking and our thanks goes out to Gail for her willingness to take this on. By the time you read this Gail will have assumed her new duties and title of Council Chair, as that happened at the November 7th congregational meeting.

Most people won't stoop to pick a penny up off the ground these days but if you get a pocket full, they do add up.


During lent this year, Sunday School children stood in the narthex after church services wearing a special pocket apron where people could deposit their pennies or other change.

INITIALS REACTION by Jeff Cook



Sometimes, just for the fun of it, when I have to indicate my authorship on a church-related email or note, I will use just my initials -'JC'. I like to think they add a certain authority to any Christian missive. I hope they will provoke what I like to call an 'Initials Reaction."

There are some other initials used by society and the church which are drawing a reaction.

The initials are the ones we have commonly used to designate time: BC referring to 'Before Christ' and AD, meaning anno Domini, "the year of our Lord."

The reason these initials are drawing a reaction is that we live in a world which is becoming both more aware and more affirming of religious pluralism and more appreciative of the religious and spiritual insights found in many faiths and religions. To designate time with initials that date everything in reference to the life of Jesus seems to contain a tinge of triumphalism and Christian dominance. Even non-Christians have to view history from a place that starts with Jesus.



These initials have been in use for a long time, although they do not date back to Jesus. According to W. Eugene March (A.B. Rhodes Professor Emeritus of Old Testament at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary), "a monk named Dionysius Exiguus, sometime in the 500s of the Common Era, was the first to use these terms to designate time categories. But not until nearly nine hundred years later, by around 1400, did the BC/AD system come into wide use in Europe."

Some scholars, (and some of us who don't define ourselves primarily as 'scholars') now use different initials to refer to the time periods before and after the zero place on the historic time scale. They now use the designations BCE, for 'Before Common Era', and CE, for 'Common Era'.

March says, "This is not a plot to get rid of Jesus, no matter what some of the conspiracy theorists among us may say. Rather, the scholarly community has found that this terminology effectively designates events before the time of Jesus and after Jesus without the religious imperialism of the 'traditional' lingo.

So, if you see or hear CE or BCE being used, you will know that it is the time measurement equivalent of having converted from miles to kilometers - just another way of saying the same thing.

A SAFE HOME - HOUSE OF PEACE

When Mojan came to Canada from Afghanistan at fourteen years of age, she had not been to school and had never even held a pen in her hand. She now has a job and lives in her own apartment.



The House of Peace provides safe, affordable housing for women of different faiths, cultures, and life commitment who are in transition. They have the opportunity to stay up to two years. Because of the need for this type of housing, a building expansion is taking place to enable the House of Peace to provide space for 14 - 17 women.

- ⇒ No open packaging. Although there is nothing wrong with bulk items, they cannot go into the hampers. This includes pasta and leftover Halloween candy.

Here is what we need to collect. Everything you donate is definitely appreciated and TMUC really does a great job of making sure 15 families in our community have a good Christmas.

For the past two weeks we have collected Proteins and Breakfast Items. We are asking for donations of the following items on the dates listed:

November 21st—Beverages (includes juice, coffee and tea)

November 28th—Soup (both cans and boxed), Pasta and Rice

December 5th—Canned Vegetables and Fruit

December 12th—The rest of the fixings for Christmas (includes Jello, Stuffing, Cookies, Cake Mixes, Sugar and Cranberry Sauce)

GETTING READY FOR CHRISTMAS

"In the sixth month, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee..." - Luke 1:26



Apparently even God was busy getting ready for Christmas!

On Christmas Eve we will gather to worship and hear the story of the birth of Jesus. The story of the birth extends into both the past and the future. Like the flame of a candle, it casts a light that reaches beyond itself.

In Luke's Gospel, the story of Jesus's birth was preceded by the story of the birth of John the Baptizer. The angel Gabriel comes to Zechariah to announce that he and Elizabeth will give birth to a child. Later, Gabriel was sent to Mary to announce that she and Joseph will give birth to a child. God was busy sending messages. Gabriel was the messenger, a kind of embodied email. Today he might say to Elizabeth and Mary, "You've got mail. It's from God. Listen.."

After hearing the news, Mary visited her cousin Elizabeth and sang about the amazing things God was doing. After John was born, his father Zechariah also burst into song. Something about Christmas leads us into music.

The church gets ready for Christmas during the four Sundays prior to Christmas day - a time, or season, called Advent (meaning 'arrival'). During that time most of us are also busy preparing for the holiday aspects of Christmas - planning Christmas dinner, making or buying gifts, writing and sending emails or cards, decorating the tree...

While we are busy, it is a good faith practice to remember that God is also busy.

The word *Christmas* derives from the Middle English *Christmasse* and the Old English *Cristes maesses*, both of which mean 'Christ's mass.' The Mass, or Eucharist, commonly denotes the sharing of the Lord's Supper, or communion. The word 'Mass', however, comes from the Latin *missio* meaning 'dismissal'. Over time, the Christian church came to use this term to refer to Jesus' dismissing of his disciples as he sent them into the world to proclaim the gospel. *Missio* came to mean 'mission'.

Thus, Christmas can be understood to mean "Christ's mission'.

That mission, that task, extends into the past history of God's creating of life. It extends into the past history of God calling a people to be blessed in order to bless others. It extends into the past of prophets saying that God desires justice and mercy and compassion for all.

Christ's mission refers to the way Jesus lived as if this world was indeed God's world - healing people of physical and emotional and societal wounds, inviting all people to banquet at God's table, praying for God's love to be displayed in all aspects of life, forgiving rather than retaliating, embracing all people as children of God.

As we gather to hear the story of the baby born in a manger, the story invites us to envision a future shaped by Christ's mission. The story invites us to realize that God is still busy - at Christmas and at all times - loving us into being more loving, inviting us to share in Christ's mission.

God was busy getting ready for Christ's mission - for Christmas. May we also be busy getting ready for Christmas - for Christ's mission.
