CONGREGATIONAL UPDATE MEETING

The role of volunteers in the life and work of TMUC was highlighted during a congregational update meeting on Nov. 4.

Gail Purcell, Chair of the TMUC Council thanked all the volunteers who volunteer to serve on committees, teach Sunday School, help with Dinner Theatre, Food Bank and other programs. She said she calculated that over 4,200 hours of volunteer hours are part of TMUC's ministry every year. Purcell's calculations did not include the hours spent by members of the various choirs, which would probably add over 2500 more hours!

"We have amazing volunteers," said Purcell. "The church would not be the church without our volunteers of the past, our volunteers of the present and our volunteers of the future."

Purcell said that "volunteering will always be needed in the church."

She said that the church wants to provide everyone with an opportunity to participate, but to avoid burning anyone out.

Don Heinrichs, TMUC's treasurer, gave a financial update. He said that, as of the end of September 2012, the congregation had a deficit of \$8,178, compared to a deficit of \$23,000 at the same point last year.

"We are heading in the right direction," said Heinrichs. He expressed appreciation to all those involved in fund-raising efforts, especially the Dinner Theatre which raised \$12,000. Heinrichs also said the congregation is to be thanked for the "sweat equity' – work done by volunteers which otherwise would have required hiring someone.

Purcell said TMUC will be presenting a request at the November meeting of Winnipeg Presbytery to receive permission for conducting a capital funds campaign in the Spring of 2013. (NOTE: Presbytery did grant permission.) Following suggestions for the Presbytery committee which reviewed TMUC's renovation plan, the monetary amounts have been "rolled forward" to reflect a 2015 dollar amount of approximately \$1.5 million. has been retained to assist TMUC with its capital campaign. TMUC has received a federal grant of \$25,000 (with an additional \$10,000 to be contributed by TMUC) for the new flooring in Yale Hall. The hall will receive new flooring, as well as wall sconces. The exterior walls have been dry-walled, mudded and painted.

An application has also been submitted for another \$50,000 grant (requiring a \$17,000 commitment from TMUC). If this grant is received, the money would be used to construct a ramp at the entrance to the choir room, replace the windows in the Christian Education building and fit them with remote controlled blinds. Several community groups/businesses have pledged to be our partners in this application, promising some financial assistance for the work.

Purcell said that TMUC will also apply for a \$46,000 Community Infrastructure Improvement Grant (TMUC would need to commit \$23,000), but will withdraw this application if the \$50,000 grant is procured.

The congregation approved using money from the Building Fund, if required, to support either of these grants if received.

Deanna Howard, Vice-Chair of the Council, reported on a new program called "Walk About" which will invite people to meet in four different locations (a corporate board room, an inner city ministry, a cathedral style sanctuary, and at TMUC) to discuss what it means to be the church today.

Rev. Carol Fletcher reported on the 'Saturday Studios: Healthy Together Now" program being offered in November and December (see the article on page 9).



THE ROAD HOME FROM GENERAL COUNCIL

This past summer I was one of 15 nominees for Moderator of The United Church of Canada. About 350 commissioners (voting representatives) from across Canada gathered for a week in Ottawa for the General Council meeting which would elect the Moderator.

The Rev. Dr. Gary Paterson, from British Columbia, was chosen Moderator on the sixth ballot.

I feel honoured to have been nominated by Winnipeg Presbytery. I feel my faith has been stretched and deepened by the time spent 'discerning' whether to allow my name to be placed in nomination (a time of prayer, reflection and discussion with others). Those who were nominees had to submit written materials and offer a five-minute speech during the GC meeting.

One of the lasting blessings I have of the experience is the sense of friendship and mutual support amongst the nominees. In an email to the nominees this Fall, a General Council staff person said, "There was truly something unique about this Council's group of nominees! Many people have commented to me about the bonds that formed between the nominees and your out-pouring of respect and support for each other."

During this process I have greatly appreciated the support offered by the TMUC community – by our M & P Committee, Church Council, and by many individuals who offered words of congratulations and encouragement. I also say thank you to Tristan Flett for technologically making it possible for a number of people to watch my speech by way of live streaming in TMUC's sanctuary.

My biggest thanks go to Carol, who not only supported my nomination but was prepared to accept the challenge of teaming with someone else for three years if I had been elected.

While I would have appreciated the opportunity to see what I could offer to the church in the role of Moderator, I am very happy to know that my next three years (at least) will be here at TMUC, discovering and responding to Christ's call to discipleship in the company of this wonderful congregation. The Spirituality of the Labyrinth by Gail Purcell

The labyrinth has been described as a symbol of our journey through life. The centre may be taken to represent enlightenment, self realization, perfection or salvation.

The first time you walk a labyrinth you may feel slightly confused and feel like you might get lost. You will quickly see that as long as you stay on the path and keep walking, you can't get lost. Labyrinths are not new to Transcona Memorial. A few years ago we made labyrinths out of clay in Sunday School for the children to learn a different way to pray.

Have you wanted to walk a labyrinth? The floor in the newly renovated Yale Hall contains one. Watch for your invitation to walk the labyrinth together as a faith community. The labyrinth will also be available during the week for private journeys and reflection time.

TOUR OF A LIFETIME

Klusmeier has collaborated with numerous authors, including Walter Farquharson, Ruth Duck, and Brian Wren.

A volunteer choir participated in the TMUC concert. Ron played piano, shared stories and both the choir and audience joined in singing.

The Tour of a Lifetime will be Klusmeier's last Canadian Tour. Besides celebrating Ron's ministry of music, the Tour also raises

awareness and funds for the Canadian Food Grains Bank, as well as informing people about the value of the United Church Observer magazine to the life of The United Church of Canada.

Klusmeier has also recorded several CD's and composed the music for two cantatas written by Walter Farquharson. Klusmeier lives on Vancouver Island. He has served as Minister of Music at several congregations and has led workshops throughout Canada and the United States.

TMUC has hosted two Messy Church gatherings this Fall - a burrito supper on September 16 and a pancake brunch on October 13. People ages 5 to much older (the polite way of referring to some of us senior middle-aged folk) helped slice, peal, mix and cook the food.

Amnesty International

For more than 25 years, Transcona Memorial has participated in Amnesty International campaigns for justice.

Amnesty International (AI) was founded in 1961. It is an non-governmental organization which researches and raises awareness of human rights abuses. All invites people to participate in letter writing campaigns to pressure governments to comply with international rights and standards. In 1977, Amnesty was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for its campaign against torture.

The Outreach Committee of TMUC has supported Amnesty's work, has often been a paid member of AI, and has promoted letter signing and writing campaigns within the congregation.

The internet now allows more people to access Amnesty's resources. On the Amnesty sites you can learn about specific instances of human rights concerns and to whom you may direct emails or letters calling for action. You are encouraged to look at these sites and participate in Amnesty's work.

Amnesty's international website is amnesty.org.uk. Amnesty also has a Canadian website which contains more information on some specifically Canadian campaigns, such as focusing public attention on the need to stop violence against Indigenous women and girls in Canada and calling on the Canadian government to ensure the protection and safety of First Nations, Métis and Inuit women and their families. COMING TO CHRISTMAS by Carol Fletcher and Jeff Cook

Have you ever been asked: Are you coming to dinner? Are you coming to the movies? Are you coming to the service? Are you coming to that concert?

Are you coming...to Christmas?

Christians come to Christmas. We spend four weeks coming to Christmas. We call those four weeks 'Advent' (which means 'to come to").

We take time to come to Christmas. We 'approach' Christmas. We can't just show up, we have to approach, to come to, to journey. We have to take time to get to Christmas, time to hear stories about an odd wilderness-dweller named John. Time to hear stories about two expectant peasant women – women expecting not only the birth of their children but the birth of something new into their world.

We take time to pray, to ask God for some sense of peace, of stillness, of hope in this often troubled and troubling and hectic world.

We take time to wonder about Mary and Joseph as they come to the village of Bethlehem, as they come to a place of birth.

We take time. We approach Christmas. We come to Christmas, because for Christians, coming to Christmas is a kind of homecoming. Coming to Christmas is coming to a baby named Jesus. Coming to Christmas is coming to a birth from which we cannot walk away.

Something about this birth, something about this Jesus, keeps coming back to us, whispering to us that God is up to something in this world; whispering to us that a child of God was born to remind us that each of us is a child of God; whispering to us that each of God's children is, amazingly, God's favourite child.
