ANNUAL MEETING WRAP UP

TMUC'S 60th Annual Congregational Meeting was held on Sunday, February 3, 2013.

Following the morning worship service, people assembled in Yale Hall and enjoyed a lunch of soup, served by youth of the congregation. The lunch marked the windup of their Souper Bowl of Caring program, which this year collected about 600 cans of soup for the Food Bank.

Gail Purcell, Chair of the TMUC Council, used a power point presentation to review some of the highlights and accomplishments of the Council, Teams and groups during 2012.

TMUC ended the year with an operating surplus of about \$1600.00. The meeting approved a 2013 budget of \$376,390.60. Purcell reminded people of the capital campaign that will be launched soon. The campaign aims to raise about \$1.25 million to renovate the building by installing a new elevator, new accessible washrooms, revised office space, a meeting area and storage space. She announced that five families have already pledged a total of \$163,000.00 over three years.

Harvey Hochkievich was elected Chair-Elect of the Council. Deanna Howard became the current Chair. Following the meeting was the annual cake auction, with proceeds going to the Building Fund.

TRADING PLACES

TMUC's Chancel Choir traded places with the choir of Grey Street United Church on Sunday, January 13.

While the Chancel Choir participated in Grey Street's service, Director Wilma McMillan led the Grey Street Choir in an anthem, hymn singing, singing the introit and the other musical components of TMUC's worship service. Grey Street's organist, Virginia Heinrichs, accompanied the choir.

The folk from Grey Street commented on how great the acoustics are in our choir loft. (although, they did not envy our choir members having to sing at a morning service beginning at 10am, since Grey Street's Sunday worship service is 10:30 am.)

Following the service, choir members were invited to Suthwyn hall for refreshments and the chance to visit with members of our congregation.

The Chancel Choir, Director Dorothy Ross and organist Donna Hnatiuk went to Grey Street. Trading Choirs may become an annual occurrence.

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CONFERENCE BURSARY FUNDS

Each year our Conference of Manitoba and North Western Ontario awards those who apply for various bursaries.

The Conference Bursary includes those in the Designated Lay Ministry program as well as those working toward ordained or diaconal ministry. In 2012, four applicants shared the \$11,000.00.

The United Church Women's Bursary is awarded to persons at least 18 years of age (and not in, or studying towards, paid accountable ministry) and who are taking a course that would benefit a local United Church congregation. Two applicants shared the \$500.00 bursary in 2012.

As well, there is the Agatha Kaasa Bursary established in 2003 by the National United Church Women. It is available to women for leadership training, continuing education or projects.

WELCOME BACK TO EASTER

"But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb" – Luke 24:1

It was the women who came to the tomb in the fading light of that early dawn. Perhaps it had to do with the nature of their love – a love that always sought the beloved, even in the place of death. Perhaps, in that male-dominated violent world, women were considered to be no threat, so the women could go where the male disciples could not.

Perhaps their grief, their love, compelled them to honour Jesus just one last time and to ensure that his body was prepared with spices and ointments for burial. That was the proper, the expected thing to do.

And so it was the women who became the first bearers of the good news of Easter. They arrived to find the tomb open ("They found the stone rolled away from tomb" -24:2). The body of Jesus was gone.

And then, two men were beside them: two men in "dazzling clothes", a Biblical code for messengers from God. They told them that Jesus was no longer amongst the dead, that he was risen. The women remembered Jesus, remembered his trust that even death would not end their awareness of his presence. They remembered, and they went to tell the other disciples.

Have you ever experienced a sense of hope when everything should seem hopeless? Jesus was dead. He had been executed by the Roman empire. The women, all of the disciples were grieving. He was dead. The kingdom of which he spoke had become just one more pipe dream. The time of new creation was finished, snuffed out, kaput...dead.

We don't get to Easter unless we are first willing to go with the women to the tomb. We don't get to Easter without the grief. We don't get to Easter without knowing that Easter is not something we accomplish, it is something God doesfor us and to us and in us.

EASTER!!!!!!!! We come to the tomb. We come to the time of final good-byes, and God surprises us. God turns good-bye into hello again. God transforms an ending into a beginning. As the final credits roll, God is heard to say "By the way, I'm making a sequel."

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We are now an Easter people. We are now a people who can never say that our experience of Jesus is ended. We can never say that God's love has run its course. We can never say that the church has no future...

Because God may just have one more surprise, one more hello, one more beginning, one more sequel.

Easter is our new word for 'hope'. Easter is the possibility of God pulling the rug out from beneath our certainties of how things must turn out. Easter is a trust that our story, the church's story, God's story, Jesus' story are always open-ended. Easter is being surprised to discover, that every chapter in these stories, is another Chapter One.

So welcome back to Chapter One! Welcome back to Easter!!

Hallelujah!!!
